LETTER TO THE EDITOR

I feel that I must write in support of Judy Bishop's letter in last month's Parish News.

Like Judy I have only recently learnt of the proposed new Tesco Supermarket from an acquaintance newly moved into our village.

Rumour has it that it is being proposed as a solution to the traffic problems surrounding our small parade of shops. Rumour also has it that the proposed site is the parcel of land along Heckfords Road and in front of the new Admirals Green development. Again rumour has it that this parcel of land was gifted to Hills Building Group as part of the land purchase for the Admirals Green development in order to build a much needed new Health Centre, but I'm told that *recollections now differ*.

If this development were to go ahead it wouldn't really solve any of the traffic problems in our village. Most of the problems are caused by inconsiderate drivers traversing through the village, trying to bulldoze their way across the green and past the parade of shops, unwilling to exercise a little consideration.

Great Bentley and its neighbour, Frating, are a well known cut-through for the A120, not helped by traffic trying to turn right at the Heckfords Road / A133 junction which can cause lengthy tailbacks. How much worse would this all become with a full scale supermarket en route?

Also, if this development were to go ahead, not only would the Tesco express probably close but how long would it be before we lose the butchers, the deli, and the post office? Yes, maybe there would be less traffic parked outside the shops but the road between the Plough and Thorrington Road would become gridlocked with all the cars already parked along that road??

As Judy has said, why has this only just come to light? I would suggest that a public meeting needs to take place with all the relevant parties before any further progression of this proposal.

Speaking to one of our doctors I'm told that our small surgery is taking hundreds of new patients every month. This is, of course, unsustainable. A new Health Centre is needed far more than another "small business killing" supermarket.

PET NOTES





September is finally here and a new chapter of my life will begin when **Weeley Veterinary Centre opens on Monday 26**th. My team and I look forward to serving you and your furry family members for many decades to come.

This month I'd like to raise awareness of <u>stick injuries</u> in dogs. Exercise is important and playing fetch with your pooch is a great way to make it more enjoyable for both of you. When out and about it can be very tempting to pick up a stick and throw it because a) it's free and b) it's fun but did you know it can cause serious injury to your best friend?

Q. What is a "stick injury"?

- A. Any injury caused by a stick. They are common and can be very serious, potentially even life threatening. I have seen the following injuries:
- The dog ran onto the stick as it landed which caused it to become impaled
- The stick became wedged between the big teeth at the back, across the roof of the mouth



- The dog attempted to swallow the stick and it pierced their oesophagus (food pipe)
- A very unwell dog was diagnosed with a pyothorax (pus in the chest caused by a bacterial infection)
 caused by chewing a stick a few days/weeks earlier. A splinter had travelled through the poor dog taking
 the infection with it. I'm pleased to report the dog survived but it was stressful, and they required costly
 treatment.

The key message here is: Prevention is better than cure.

- Q. What are the common symptoms of a stick injury?
- A. Depending on the nature and site of the injury, you may notice one or more of the following:
- Your dog is distressed (unsettled, panting, pawing at mouth)
- Lots of salivation/bloody saliva
- Reluctance to eat
- Swelling and/or abscess, especially of the face and neck



A. Please don't feel you must stop playing fetch. Simply swap the stick for a dog-safe toy available, for example, a frisbee.

My team and I look forward to meeting you and your pets soon.



Farming Diaries

You may have noticed that the gentle purr of the combines has now stopped, harvest for most has finished in record time for many due to the very dry weather we have experienced. Usually farmers would be following up straight behind the combine drilling oilseed rape (OSR) but the severe lack of moisture has put plans on hold. If we get steady rainfall to allow the water to percolate through the soil rather than heavy rain which would rapidly run off, farmers may consider drilling OSR. If however this does not happen growers may wait and drill into September (depending on variety) or change cropping plans completely and not grow OSR this year.



A great deal will happen between when the new seasons' crops are drilled and when they are harvested. The weather as you know plays a key role in a plant's development and any deviation from the usual pattern of weather can have a significant impact on harvested yields even from such an early stage as drilling in the next couple months. If we have a poor autumn where we still get little rainfall or the opposite farmers could continue to have difficulty drilling crops, they may not be able to apply the crop protection products to suppress and control weeds which would compete against the crop for light, water and nutrient resources. Even if the rest of the year is relatively 'normal' in terms of the weather patterns we would expect to experience the initial setback when the crop was established that can have an effect on yields.

Although harvesting of cereal crops is now finished, the harvesting of root crops such as potatoes is still well underway and will continue into October. Locally in Great Bentley a large number of potatoes are grown but they are also grown across the Tendring Hundred area so you won't have to travel too far before you see a harvester lifting potatoes from the ground. These potatoes could go to local farm shops, to the supermarkets for the loose or pre-packed market or be sent for processing. In some supermarkets they have the name and the location of the farm on packets of pre-packed potatoes so why not have a look and see which area your potatoes come from. Hopefully they are locally sourced and from the surrounding area.

Sugar beet will begin to be harvested and again like potatoes you won't have to travel too far before you see a field where sugar beet is being lifted. It will continue to be lifted until mid-January and be sent to the British Sugar Factory at Bury St Edmunds to be processed into the various 'Silverspoon' branded sugar you see on the shop shelves.

ANNUAL VOTER INFORMATION CHECK BEING ISSUED

The time has come around again when letters are being sent out to households across Tendring asking people to check their electoral register details, to ensure Tendring's Electoral Registration Office holds the correct information for those who may wish to vote at upcoming elections.

Residents who get a white letter do not need to respond, as long as all the information is correct; while households who receive a yellow letter must confirm their details and submit any changes that may be needed. The easiest way to confirm the details or make changes is online, using the details provided in the letter. Alongside the letters, emails and text messages will also go out asking those who need to update or to confirm their details.

lan Davidson, Electoral Registration Officer for Tendring, said it was vital that everyone checks their details are correct.

It is important not to lose the chance to vote and to confirm all the details for your household as your vote matters. Details required include your nationality, whether you are on the open register, and if you have a postal or proxy vote.

While text and online is the most efficient means for you to confirm or update your details, households can still complete the canvass form by phone or by post. To reply by post residents will need to provide an envelope and stamp.

ESSEX PEDAL POWER - ONE YEAR ANNIVERSARY IN CLACTON AND JAYWICK SANDS

An event, held at Clacton Greensward on Saturday 23rd July 2022, saw residents, volunteers, local organisations and partners all come together to celebrate a year of the Essex Pedal Power project.

The successful community-based initiative has made cycling more accessible for people living in Clacton and Jaywick Sands, with over 280 new bikes currently distributed to eligible residents, and a further 1,000 over the next year. Also adapted bikes are being provided for applicants with a disability.

The £2.7 million pilot scheme is a partnership of Active Essex Local Delivery Pilot, Essex County Council, SELEP, The Active Wellbeing Society (TAWS), Tendring District Council, Community Voluntary Services Tendring, Bikeability Trust, Raleigh Bikes, See Sense, Sport England, Cycling UK and local community groups. The project also includes a £1.7m upgrade of the cycling path between Clacton and Jaywick Sands. Since launching in June 2021, Essex Pedal Power has already made a positive impact to the lives of those who have received a bike, as well as creating new community cycling groups, a brilliant cohort of volunteers and regular learn to ride training sessions.

Essex Pedal Power has given the free travel option to be able to access education, training and employment opportunities.

Some residents who have taken up this opportunity have said Essex Pedal Power has opened opportunities beyond cycling. Their health and wellbeing has improved, with many stating they have lost weight, are more physically active and their mental health has been positively impacted, just by getting outside and cycling on a regular basis.

Due to the pilot's success, Essex Pedal Power will launch in Colchester later this year, and in Harwich next year.



COUNCIL TO CONSIDER FUTURE USE OF SMALL PARCELS OF LAND ACROSS TENDRING

Tendring District Council's Cabinet has tasked officers to look at what 70 small pieces of under-utilised land, owned by the authority with a combined total of 10 hectares and being a mixture of open and brownfield space could be used for.

One option could be to build council homes – to help reduce the number of households on the housing register – to build more garages, which are in high demand; or to sell the land, using the money generated to support other council priorities. Alternatively, the sites may be kept as open space. Officers will not explore all the sites at once, but instead will focus first on those which are the larger areas.

This poem was written by Jean Ward, an intrepid train traveller who now lives in Lawford. You may see it on your travels as it's being used in some posters on the railways!


What can you gain whey you travel by train? You can look out, you can think, You can nibble and drink.

Here's why you should NEVER swim in quarries or lakes to cool off during a heatwave

The lovely sunny weather is proving to make bathing in lakes enticing, which has been reported by a neighbouring village and happens all over the country. The water may look harmless, but all the dangers are **beneath the surface**. The water itself has the potential for disease and toxins and you could be jumping into unknown **obstructions and weed beds**.

Taking the plunge in lakes and quarries is extremely dangerous, for reasons you may never have considered.

For one, you never know the temperature of the water when you dive in.

Quarry water is normally far colder than river or sea water, and can send your body into shock or leave you too exhausted to swim within minutes of jumping in.

The water can be so cold because of its depth, with underground springs pumping extremely cold water into the quarry.

If you can't stand up in a lake or quarry, there will be no way to recover from the shock of the temperature - and you increase your risk of drowning.

CRICKET CLUB

GREAT BENTLEY

The day Great Bentley Green became the Home of Cricket.

Great Bentley welcomed the Marylebone Cricket Club, more commonly known as the MCC to the village on Sunday 17th July, to play a one-day match against our very own village cricket team. The match was the climax of months of preparation for the celebration of the 250th anniversary of cricket being played on The Green -- the first recorded match being played in 1771 between The Essex Gentlemen and Tendring Hundred for the prize of eleven hats!

The day had begun early with a breakfast BBQ and a training session for the growing number of children who are taking up the game in the village. All the children were presented with a medal to commemorate the occasion.

At 11am, to the sound of a peel of church bells being rung to celebrate the event, as is traditional, the two captains, Alex Youngs of Great Bentley, Darren Eckford of the MCC and the umpires, went to the middle to toss a coin to see who would bat or field on scorching hot day. Eckford won the toss and elected to bat on a wicket expertly prepared by the club chairperson, Peter Giles and his grandson Jack.

As the sun shone brightly and the crowd of over 200 made up of invited guests, villagers and local cricket enthusiasts looked on, Michael Wright had the honour of bowling the first ball to MCC opener Ahmed from the "Pavilion end". Josh Fowler bowled the second over from the "Surgery end" to Robinson. Both MCC batters soon got into their stride hitting square cuts, pulls and drives often sending the ball racing to the boundary. Bentley captain Youngs used all the bowlers in his armoury throughout the morning session trying to break what was becoming a formidable partnership. While there were a couple of half chances no wickets fell and the MCC reached 227 without loss at lunch.

Lunch, provided by The Fusiliers pub and sponsored by Gibbons Farms, was served in the marquee, and went down extremely well. Perhaps it was the excellent food (or the odd glass of wine!) that reinvigorated the Bentley team but after lunch the wickets began to tumble with Ahmed finally out for an incredible 135 including two towering sixes in one over, closely followed by Robinson who fell for 92. When MCC batter Hills fell to a fantastic running overhead catch by Barney Morton off the bowling of James Pearce with the score on 282-5 the MCC declared. The pick of the bowling was from the excellent James Pearce who took four wickets for 31 in seven overs, the other wicket falling to the bowling of Greg Wainer who was, like the other Bentley bowlers, unlucky not to take more.

The Great Bentley opening batters Michael Giles and Joe Fowler started well chasing 283 to win but Fowler, who had picked up an injury fielding, fell to a leaping slip catch by Fernandes off the bowling of the very impressive Watts with the score on just 10. That wicket bought Barney Morton to the crease who set about making a match of it with some swashbuckling shots while at the other end Giles stoically kept the MCC bowlers at bay. Once Giles fell on 28, tea was taken at 78-2 - just after play was interrupted by the arrival of the local Police helicopter landing on the green much to the excitement of the children – some who were lucky enough to climb aboard.

After tea, James Snowdon fell for a quick fire 13, including three fours in three balls, Adam Cuthbert was clean bowled by Essex second XI player Fernandes for 4 then shortly after Morton fell, also bowled by Fernandes, for an excellent 84. Morton was applauded from the field, not only by the partisan crowd, but also the appreciative opposition. Despite the best efforts of the remaining Bentley batters; Greg Wainer, Ed Kerridge, Josh Fowler and Michael Wright, who all put up strong resistance the wickets were falling with a regularity that suggested only one result was likely. When Bentleys last batter, Lily Wainer, came to the crease there was a mountain to climb to save the game; the score was 178, nine wickets had fallen, the MCC surely has too many overs to get just one more wicket. However, through some classic defensive batting and hitting out when offered the chance, as the match entered the final over one wicket was still needed. The fielders closed in surrounding the batters looking for that vital catch but, very fittingly, the club captain and the only female player on the field held out and the match ended in a well-earned draw. An amazing end to what was a glorious day for both the club and cricket. For the record Great Bentley ended on 192-9 with Sharam and Fernandes taking four wickets a piece for the MCC.

The club would like to thank the MCC, all the sponsors and all those that donated their time and energy to help make this an incredible and memorable day.

Heatwave continues to cause issues

September 2022

The unprecedented heatwave continues to cause problems for our wildlife. Even when it rains it will take at least two weeks to soak into the hard ground and soften it. So please do continue to feed the wildlife, especially as many of the autumn fruits that should have been developing have shrivelled in the drought. We have many hoglets that are over their required weight and are ready for release, but they are having to stay until we get enough substantial rain to ensure their food supply.

Buzzard on arrival

A juvenile buzzard was found by a film crew making a drama series in the Fingringhoe ranges. He was picked up by two of the crew after he was found collapsed and brought to Wildlives, where he was found to be emaciated and starving. After being built up with fluids and hand-feeding little and often, he picked up quickly and was soon ready to go into a flight pen. As the Wildlives flight pen is currently full of other recovering birds of prey, Peter took him to one of his flight pens. He was ringed and successfully released at full weight and flying strongly.

A gull was found in Colchester town centre entangled high up in netting, The fire brigade successfully went up and rescued him, but were unable to reach another one that was trapped, so sadly the second will die a slow death out of reach of rescue. The first was brought to Wildlives but was found to have a completely necrotic foot and a smashed thigh, so had to be put to sleep. This was completely avoidable if only people would stop irresponsible and thoughtless use of netting.

The barn owl featured previously made a brilliant recovery after he completed his cage rest for a broken clavicle and moved to the flight pen. Simon ringed him and contacted the landowner where he was found. He was taken to a tree there where barn owls had been nesting, but ignored the tree and flew off out of sight.

GARDENING NOTES

The parched landscapes this summer have been more reminiscent of driving through southern France than our green and pleasant land. For gardeners, this summer has been all about managing water. Unlike the hot summer of 1976, which was preceded by a dry winter, we were fortunate in this area to have had good rainfalls last winter which meant we entered the summer with reasonable levels of water in reservoirs. So, at the time of writing, we still do not have a hosepipe ban, but many are trying to do their bit to conserve available water. The result is a number of failed or smaller harvests which can be disappointing

after all the earlier work put in to establish plants earlier, and for local horticultural shows, predictable lower numbers of entries in their first year operating since 2019. On a positive note, at least the shows have been happening and there is always next year!

We are now in the new bungalow but a lot of the planting is only weeks or months old, requiring supplementary watering. More established planting is better able to cope with drought but planting that is less than 2 years old is very vulnerable. Fortunately, one of the design features we decided was worth the investment was a 5000 litre underground rainwater harvesting tank and water tanks on the garage, greenhouse and sheds. This has helped enormously.

Reading up through this winter on the various ways of improving water management for your garden would be a good investment for the next dry summer, whenever it comes.

It is useful for watering purposes if a plant is in a slight saucer shaped depression to enable supplementary watering to go down to the roots instead of running away from the plant. Mulching around plants will help to retain moisture in the soil and root ball.

Alternatively bury a small flower pot or a bottle with the bottom cut off and the cap off next to the plant and water into it. Works well but will need the mulch and soil cleared from it to be fully effective.

We heard an interesting tip from Lucy Chamberlain the BBC Essex gardening advisor who suggests it is better to water early in the morning especially for those plants that are eaten by slugs and snails. Her view is that as slugs and snails are nocturnal and feed at night the presence of damp soil makes their feeding easier.


As it is often necessary to increase humidity in the glasshouse during the day the benefit of watering in the morning is that by evening the humidity level will have dropped back. At evening/night too high a humidity level could help to cause/worsen Botrytis and Tomato blight. It all becomes a bit academic in the recent 30-degree centigrade temperatures when greenhouses have needed watering twice a day. If forced to water in strong sunshine take care not to splash foliage or fruit.

Winter squashes and pumpkins will benefit from having the fruit placed on tiles or slates to prevent rotting and they will benefit from a late feed.

Pull out spent crops and either feed to chickens, compost or if diseased dispose of. This removes some possibilities for pests or disease to multiply.

Having spent the last few weeks ensuring maximum ventilation to the greenhouse it will now be time to close doors and ventilators to keep the temperature at night higher and remove shading provided to deal with the summer sun.

Surgery News

We are fast approaching flu vaccination season and I want to take this opportunity to remind everyone who is eligible to **call us from the 5 September 2022** to make an appointment for your annual NHS flu jab. Flu vaccinations will be available this year to all patients aged 50 and over and those under 50 with chronic health conditions.

Although I cannot give you exact dates as I write this Newsletter, the Flu Clinics will start in late September and will be running on a Saturday. We will of course continue to provide vaccinations opportunistically during normal routine appointments for eligible patients, (subject to deliveries of the vaccine being on time), so there is no need to book a separate flu appointment if you are seeing a clinician for a face to face appointment.

Flu is an unpredictable virus that can cause mild or unpleasant illness in most people, BUT it can cause severe illness and even death among vulnerable groups including older people, pregnant women and people with an underlying health condition. If you are not sure if you are eligible, please give us a call. We are unable to provide private vaccinations, but many local pharmacies do.

By having your flu jab, you are not only helping yourself, but you are also helping to protect the wider population from this nasty virus which can easily spread to vulnerable people who are much more at risk from complications.

For those patients eligible for a Covid booster vaccination, we are hoping to be able to give this along with the flu jab, as long as we receive delivery of the vaccine in time.

Surgery Premises Update

We have been asked for an update on what is happening with regard to our Surgery premises. Please see the article below from Dr Freda Bhatti, our Senior Partner.

To clarify, there will be no new surgery development in Great Bentley or elsewhere in the foreseeable future. The process of building a new surgery is immensely complicated and involves not just the Doctors but a developer, Clinical Commissioning Group (now Integrated Care Systems) and NHS England. Unfortunately, any development proposal that has been made has not fulfilled certain criteria in that process. There are many obstacles that must be overcome and there is little point being too specific, other than to state we have not been successful with the plans proposed to date. That is not to say we will not succeed one day in a new surgery building for Great Bentley and surrounding areas. The new Integrated Care Systems (our one is Suffolk and North East Essex - SNEE), established on 1 July 2022 with the end of CCGs, have been instructed by NHS England to place emphasis on improving primary care estates, as like us, many GPs nationally function out of buildings no longer fit for purpose for the modern day demands placed on GPs.

As to expansion – yes we are considering that option but have not advanced further as that is again dependent on many factors including NHS England agreement on any plans, but also the financial burden that would place on the Partnership.

Surgery Training Afternoon

Along with all other surgeries in the area we will be shut from 12 noon on Tuesday, 27 September for staff training. If patients require urgent care on this afternoon then they can contact 111 for assistance.

COOKERY CORNER



HEARTY AUTUMN SOUPS

Quite a few of our friends, as we all get older and have more time on our hands, are making their own soups. Following a recipe or inventing your own combination of ingredients will produce a tasty bowl or more which is a quick meal and very much appreciated after a hard day or a long walk. Also it is an excellent way of using up all the little forgotten bits of vegetables lurking in the fridge or those half used packets of pasta or noodles and sauces at the back of the cupboard. These recipes will serve four to six

and can also be successfully frozen.

PEA AND HAM (LONDON PARTICULAR)

1 ham hock about 1kg 1 large onion 1 large carrot 1 celery stalk 300g dried green split peas

bouquet garni handful chopped parsley 1tsp white peppercorns

Soak the hock overnight in cold water (essential if it is smoked) Also soak the peas, although now this is not always necessary. Peel and cut the onion in half and rinse the hock under cold running water discarding the soaking liquid. Peel and halve the onion, peel and cut the carrot and trim and slice the celery. Put the ham in a large pan with the vegetables, bouquet garni and peppercorns. Cover with cold water and bring to the boil. Using a slotted spoon skim off any scum that rises to the surface. Reduce the heat and simmer gently for 2 to 3 hours, topping up with boiling water if necessary and skimming off any more scum that appears on the surface. This could also be done in a pressure cooker or slow cooker. When the meat is falling off the bone, remove the pan from the heat and lift out the ham, leaving it to cool slightly. Strain the liquor through a sieve into a clean pan and discard the vegetables and herbs. Rinse the soaked peas and stir them into the poaching liquor. Bring the liquid to the boil and simmer gently for 1 to 2 hours until the peas are really soft. Pull the meat from the bone and shred into small pieces. Puree the soup, reserving a little of the ham, and adding a little water if the soup is too thick. Check the seasoning and mix the reserved ham with the chopped parsley. Reheat and ladle into bowls, sprinkling with the ham and parsley.

SCOTCH BROTH

500g stewing lamb 1 carrot 1 leek 2 celery sticks 500ml chicken stock 1tbsp light soy sauce 95g brown rice or pearl barley 2tbsp light olive oil

Peel the carrot, clean the leek and celery and dice all the vegetables, also cutting up the celery leaves. Trim the lamb of as much fat as you can and cut into cubes. If using the more traditional pearl barley it may need soaking beforehand. Heat the oil in a large saucepan. Add the carrot, leek, celery sticks and leaves and cook on high for 5 minutes, stirring often. Add the lamb, stock, soy sauce, rice or pearl barley and 1 litre of water and bring to the boil. Reduce the heat to low, cover and leave to simmer for 1 hour. Season to taste and serve with soft buttered rolls.

PUMPKIN SOUP WITH HONEY

1kg pumpkin or butternut squash 75g unsalted butter 1 small onion 1 carrot

1 garlic clove 3 heaped tbsp clear honey 750ml vegetable stock 75ml double cream

lemon juice 3 sprigs sage

Finely chop both the onion and carrot and peel and crush the garlic clove, de-seed and peel the pumpkin or butternut squash and cut into cubes while renaming the recipe. Gently melt the butter in a large saucepan or casserole dish. Add the onion and carrot, stir a little and cover. Cook over a low heat for about 4 to 5 minutes, then add the cubed pumpkin, honey and sage. Stir again, replace the lid and continue to cook very gently for 10 minutes. Pour in the stock, bring to the boil and cook for about 10 minutes until the vegetables are soft. Turn off the heat and leave the soup to cool slightly then remove the sage and sieve the soup, reserving the liquid. Put half the cooked vegetables into a blender with enough of the reserved liquid to blend into a smooth

puree. Pour this into a clean saucepan and repeat with the remaining vegetables, adding the puree to the first batch in the saucepan. Pour any remaining liquid into the blender and whizz to pick up the rest of the puree, and add that to the pan also. Bring to the boil slowly then stir in the cream without boiling any more. Season to taste with a tablespoon of lemon juice, a teaspoon of salt and some freshly ground black pepper. Serve in bowls with a swirl of cream and crusty bread.

NEW HIGHWAY CODE FROM 29th JANUARY 2022

Many places are surrounded by little lanes. We all get to use them for driving, cycling, walking, horse-riding ... the new Highway Code has introduced some changes that make it easier for everyone to avoid accidents. The sensationalist media are widely misreporting this, so here are a couple of tips especially relevant for rural roads.

Main changes include:

- introducing a hierarchy of road users which ensures that those road users who can do the greatest harm to others have the greatest responsibility to reduce the threat they pose to others; this means most responsibility is with large vehicles, most vulnerable users are horse riders, motorcyclists, pedestrians, the elderly, disabled and children.
- clarifying <u>existing rules</u> on pedestrian priority on pavements and that when turning drivers and riders should give way to pedestrians crossing <u>or waiting to cross</u> the road or going straight on.
- establishing guidance on safe passing distances and speeds when overtaking cyclists or horse riders, and ensuring that they have priority at junctions when travelling straight ahead.
- Suggestion to open car doors in a way that lets you see possible oncoming cyclists known as the Dutch Reach.

Essex residents thanked for support of Homes for Ukraine scheme

Our leader, Cllr Kevin Bentley, has thanked Essex residents for their generosity in welcoming Ukrainian arrivals into their homes.

As of yesterday (28 July) 1,408 people have arrived into Essex from Ukraine under the Government's Homes for Ukraine scheme.

There are a total of 1,081 sponsors in Essex, matched with 2,471 Ukrainians. Of these 1,408, or about 57%, have arrived in Essex. These numbers continue to increase.

Generous Essex residents have helped the Department of Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC) reach an important milestone. It was announced yesterday more than 100,000 people from Ukraine have now been welcomed into homes across the UK.

Cllr Bentley said: "Since the start of this dreadful war, residents of Essex have gone above and beyond to provide support for our Ukrainian friends, first in contributing to the humanitarian aid efforts and more recently by opening up their own homes to welcome people from Ukraine with open arms.

"The Government has announced 100,000 Ukrainians have arrived in the UK under the Ukraine Family and Homes for Ukraine schemes. Essex has played a huge part in this, and I want to thank the people of our county for their astounding generosity. They have responded to what is a humanitarian crisis on a scale that many of us have not seen before in our lives with our county's trademark hospitality and kindness.

"Getting these schemes up and running in a relatively short timeframe has been an enormous task and I must also praise our partners across the public and voluntary sectors for their efforts, as well as all the staff involved.

"Of course, we know there is more work to do, and we will continue working hard to ensure Ukrainians who arrive into Essex have all the support they need, both as soon as they arrive and for as long as they are in this county."

NATURE NOTES



Just south of Colchester is the Abberton Visitor Centre, that was rebuilt when the reservoir was extended. While views of water in the middle distance are all around, from a balcony a much closer pond can be overlooked. On a recent bright afternoon visit we took our tea outside there and were soon entranced by two families of moorhens and little grebes. Aspects of feeding young that I had not seen before were witnessed from this vantage point.

A nearly full-grown moorhen still with brown plumage, indicating it was born earlier this year, was seen picking up food from the water and offering it to fluffy black chicks with red faces. They were probably younger siblings from a later brood. While I have heard of larger young birds helping care for smaller family members, I had not seen it so clearly before.


The little grebe family comprised a chestnut-cheeked adult, presumed to be the mother and four swimming young, each with a single light vertical line down their neck - a marking peculiar to grebes. She was busy diving and repeatedly coming up with a small fish that was given to the young in turn. The fish were probably small roach or rudd. An opportunity to watch this without the need for binoculars was remarkable enough. But to cap it she waited alongside the youngster, to ensure the fish was swallowed without mishap. If dropped into the water, she would dive to retrieve the fish and give it back to be eaten successfully at the second attempt. Normally we are not able to see in detail such moments of care and attention. This watery theme might serve as an antidote to the present parched scene of Mid-August drought.


