I can tell you there is nothing worse than being asked by a chap already down on his luck for something as basic as said items and having to say no! There are occasions when it is necessary to kit someone out totally from 'the inside out' as I call it and not to be able to begin with such a taken for granted item does not sit well with me. Such is the situation that although new boxer shorts will be very gratefully received by both volunteers and recipients alike they are open to donations of acceptable all ready worn laundered pairs, smaller sizes are most in demand.

For those of you who are not familiar with hope@trinity in a nutshell it is a day facility for the homeless, rough sleepers and vulnerable. The stories behind their own situation are varied and far too frequently make difficult listening but it may well be the first occasion that someone has ever taken the time and trouble to actually care, ask and most importantly LISTEN.



The 4-1 loss at Thorpe was not a true representation of the 90 minutes. Thorpe took all their chances and then held on for the win, whilst GB could not finish off periods of good attacking play with a goal. Young Barney Morton came on as sub in the second half and scored our only goal on his debut.

GB hosted Bradfield Rovers in the league KO Cup. Harvey Evans opened the scoring, converting a penalty given for a foul on him as he prepared to shoot. Blake Keogh-Kedar and Jake Vaughan were our other scorers in a good competitive game somewhat spoiled by a display of "erratic" refereeing. Jake Allwood deserved his clean sheet in goal.

The away game at Cressing Utd was always going to be tough. To then get top goal scorer Harvey Evans to go down with tonsillitis during the week was a huge blow. Cressing deserved the three points in spite of some heroics from Jake Bell and Jake Allwood.

Another away fixture and another tough game with Silver End unbeaten this season. We did not get off to a good start. Jake Allwood making an uncharacteristic mistake fumbling a cross putting us a goal down after only 5 mins. Silver End then scored a second whilst GB were still in shock.

We also welcomed big Louie Olymbios back to GB. Louie had been playing at Holland FC for the past 2 seasons, trying senior football. However, he realised that he was not enjoying his football and started training again with us whilst we arranged his transfer with Holland. GB battled to get back into the game, dominating all of the second half. The Silver End keeper kept them in the game with a number of finger tip saves. The game finished 0 – 3 but GB deserved at least a point from a very good game.

It is good to see reserve goalkeeper young Jack French coaching the youth teams goalkeepers on a Saturday morning. Continuing the fine work started several years ago by Jake Allwood. Adam Morton and Elliot Mcmillan are both on a goal scoring spree at the moment. They both scored in the draw at Frinton and Walton, then, the following week in the reserve KO Cup game against Wormingford they claimed 2 goals each in the 7 – 0 win. Other GB scorers were Will Archibald, Anthony Chatter and James Wright.

Adam scored the only goal of the game against Dedham Old Boys on Nov 5th which finished with referee Simon Bird showing 3 red cards in the last 10 minutes. Matt Maunton was unfortunate to get a second yellow card after reacting to being headbutted for a second time. Not entirely unreasonable in my opinion, after him "turning the other cheek" on the first occasion.

Elliot McMillan added to his tally. Scoring the equaliser against Brantham Athletic A. Greg Wainer claiming the winning goal in the return fixture. The clubhouse will be showing all England games in the forthcoming World Cup. Everybody welcome.

November has been a busy month again for the bell ringers with our annual departure from standard ringing to that of marking the anniversary of the Armistice and Remembrance Sunday.

Some of you may have heard the bells rung so very differently and perhaps thought that a visit to an audiologist might be required! However, do not think that your brain was decoding the sounds incorrectly! In order to make a different sound, we fix a thick leather pad to one side of the clapper so that when it hits the bell it emits the normal loud 'bong' sound, followed by a muffled 'bong', to create a kind of echo. This is a tradition observed by all church bells and ringers during the period of remembrance for the fallen from armed conflict. This is a marked contrast to the way that the bells were rung fully muffled during the period of mourning for Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth 2nd.

A group of us rang a guarter peal, consisting of 1260 changes on 6 of the church bells on Friday 11th November to mark the anniversary of the Armistice. In addition, the tenor bell was tolled leading up to the act of remembrance at the war memorial on both the 11th & 13th November.

Michael John Webster 18.02.1938-28.09.2022

Following Mike's passing Mary asked if I would like to write a piece for the magazine. Where to start? Something that would be of interest to those who did not know him whilst jogging the memories of those who did.

Firstly, Mike (also known as Mick) was a practical person: a 'fixer-upper' and a 'do-er'. He couldn't sit still for long. Having qualified as a plumber he picked up a number of skills while working on building sites. So much so that, in 1976, he designed and built the extension to the house we had moved into in January 1972. He did about 90% of the work himself, with the help of friends and the professionals who laid bricks and roof joists. He would effortlessly climb up the ladder to lay roof tiles while I watched on tenterhooks, bracing the ladder. His garage was a regular treasure trove of tools and equipment which were often loaned out to friends. He was a great DIY person, tinkering in the garage, mending items or designing and making anything that he thought would make life easier. He became the 'go-to' person if anyone had a little repair job, particularly in the plumbing line. He later enjoyed working on our children's homes when they managed to get on the housing ladder. It was a great distress to him when the garage caught fire late one evening and a lifetime of quality tools, some inherited from my Dad, went up in flames. We were extremely lucky that the fire didn't take hold in both our house and next door. However, we re-stocked and began again.

In the late 70s, when our son Neal joined the Cub Scouts, followed by daughter Helen joining the Brownies, Mike was soon involved with other parents in repairing the old scout hut behind De Vere Estate. Once again he was up a ladder fixing the roof. His contacts with building supply companies were invaluable in sourcing materials at a discount.

Another of Mike's qualities was his concern for the welfare of others. In the harsh winters he would be out and about, clearing snow from peoples pathways and digging cars out of the snow when the village was shut off for days. He would deliver hot drinks when the power was down, which was often in the 70s, (we had a camping gas stove to heat water) and check on our elderly neighbours. His only complaint was that he was known as 'Hilary's husband' to many, as working long hours as a Sales Manager they didn't usually see him.

He had quite a few hobbies over the years - DIY; sailing; playing and teaching our children squash, cards and chess; gardening on both his allotment and at home; caravanning and golf. His displays of sweet peas and annuals alongside the outer wall of our garden were a source of pleasure and admiration to many who passed by and stopped to comment.

Mike enjoyed his pints of bitter in the evenings in one or other of the local pubs (a choice of three at that time) and football club. Here he would put the world to rights, playing cribbage with the other regulars whilst our dog Lucky waited patiently at his feet. Mike also helped out behind the bar in the football club. Also, we both enjoyed the dances and regular quizzes held in the new Village Hall.

Unfortunately, ill health forced him to give up a lot of his hobbies but he was most upset at no longer being able to garden nor play golf. Arthritis in his spine from an old back injury resulted in him losing his mobility and, together with various other conditions, his later years were spent mostly confined indoors.On 23rd September he was taken into hospital following a heart attack and passed away five days later. He is sorely missed by me and our family. Hilary

NATURE NOTES

Wildlife killed crossing busy roads is often lumped together as mere roadkill – collateral damage in a modern, fast-moving world. The most conspicuous casualties are larger mammals and among birds often pheasants. Recently on the road outside my house the barred wings attached to an otherwise flattened body proved not to be that gamebird but a female Sparrowhawk. Birds-of-prey are usually adept at not being killed themselves, I have never seen a Kestrel succumb to traffic though they frequently perch beside or hover over roads. The Sparrowhawk was probably flying at hedge height perhaps in hot pursuit of prey and hit a high-sided vehicle. Unlike other raptors, flying quite low, often parallel with the ground is very characteristic when hunting. Once I was standing talking to someone in the

garden when one flashed between us at scarcely four feet. At other times they fly at more normal heights, with broader wings than the more streamlined Kestrel, that is a falcon. Alternate flapping a few times then gliding is very characteristic. In spring and warm spells, they will also soar high on the thermals like the larger, noisier Buzzards that are now so conspicuous in our skies. Sparrowhawks have adapted to taking garden birds by stealth that can sometimes prove their undoing by colliding with windows.

My road casualty had been so flattened its head, beak or yellow eye could not be appreciated. I could however tell it was a female as larger and differently marked from a male. The fine, striated pencilling of the front feathers was striking as well as the broader barred wings, of varied greys and browns. Thin yellow legs and toes showed the black talons not of even size, with the rear and one of the outer front talons much longer and the central toe protruded almost disproportionately. These differences presumably facilitate the handling and carrying of prey. A female Sparrowhawk can tackle a Woodpigeon but Collared Doves are especially favoured. Long persecuted then affected by DDT farm chemicals these small hawks' gradual return coincidentally occurred after the Collared Dove had colonised the UK and became so familiar especially from the 1980s onwards.

The Boundary Commission for England is currently undertaking a review of Parliamentary Constituency Boundaries. Worryingly, the Commission's current proposal moves The Bentleys & Frating Ward (which includes Great Bentley, Little Bentley and Frating) out of our current Harwich & North Essex seat and into a constituency with Clacton!

I imagine that this concerns you as much as it does me. As The Bentleys & Frating Ward's representative on the District Council, I find it preposterous that the villages' long-standing ties with the rural communities in North Essex, as well as the local centres of Brightlingsea and Manningtree, could be undermined in this way.

My fear is that, should The Bentleys & Frating Ward be moved to a more urban, tourism orientated, predominantly coastal constituency, our local concerns will not get the same attention - from schooling to farming, highways to public transport, the villages' influence will be diminished.

Our shared interests with other parts of our current North Essex constituency, help to amplify the voice of residents in Great Bentley, Little Bentley and Frating.

In particular, I am concerned about the potential knock-on effect for the education of local children. If the villages are moved into the Clacton Constituency, could it lead to a redrawing of school catchment areas - with local children required to attend schools in Clacton?

Say that again

Peregrine recovering from crash landing

December 2022

The peregrine falcon on the left was found by a member of the public as it crash-landed into her garden. Although there was an injury to the inside of the wing this was relatively superficial and easily treated Because he was ringed we were able to identify him as one of this year's juveniles from a nest which is being monitored by Peter. This bird was ringed before he fledged. Rosie notified Peter who completed all the necessary notifications to relevant authorities and came and collected him. He will recover fully in one of Peter's biosecure isolation flight pens.

Don't just dump animals outside the gate !!!!!

A little bat who had been mauled by a cat was just left in a box outside. Since nobody knew he was there, it was some time before we found him, by which time he was dead. Since his injuries were catastrophic it is unlikely he would have survived anyway, but you should always phone before bringing an animal or bird, and then follow the procedures when you arrive. If we do not know it is here, we can't give it the attention it needs, and as the weather grows colder such abandoned casualties may well die of hypothermia before we find them.

Please help hedgehogs in need, don't just leave them to die

Despite the warm autumn, we are still seeing tiny hogs arriving with hypothermia. As they are so small they become hypothermic very quickly, and delayed action often means it is too late. We have had several phone calls from people who have seen tiny hogs in trouble, but by the time they have phoned Wildlives they can't find the hedgehog again. If you see ANY hedgehog out in daylight, or, at this time of the year, a small hedgehog AT ANY TIME immediately pick it up. You can place it in a box with a towel-wrapped hot water bottle or a drinks bottle full of hot water (again wrapped in a towel) while you call for advice. Immediate action will save many more little lives.

Another little hog arrived after he fell into a drain. By the time he was found he was freezing cold and saturated, and soon died of hypothermia. Please make sure all your drains have sturdy covers to prevent little animals falling in.

A hog was brought in after he was strimmed. The strimmer wire had gone right round and pulled his intestines out through his back, and he was crawling in mature maggots. Needless to say he could not be saved. The lady who brought him in (and was not the strimming culprit) was notified and was appalled. She is going to letter-drop all her neighbours to warn them to check before strimming, and post it on her local facebook group.

Please tell everyone, write posts on social media, write to the local paper – do anything you can to spread the information above. The more people who are aware, the more lives that can be saved.

In science they discovered a variety of mini-beasts and the micro-habitats they reside in, in our nature garden. They are starting to recognise the essential components of WANTED posters. There is a wonderful display of the work Year 5 did on the history of Great Bentley at the back of St Mary's Church. The Church is open from 10.00am to 3.00pm to go and have a look.





In December there should be time to reflect on successes and failures to guide your gardening in 2023 but if like us you are forgetful, it is worth making a few notes during the year to guide your December decisions.

As of writing we are being deluged with rainfall, which starts to replenish the dry ground and the reservoirs after the summer drought. Assuming we get some brighter and less wet days in December, it is a good time to dig out any mature compost and

use it in the garden or to bag it for later use. Established rhubarb can be re-invigorated by digging it out and dividing clumps with a spade so that the outer sections containing at least one bud can be replanted into enriched soil. Any surplus viable pieces can be potted up and moved into a greenhouse or tall cold frame for forcing to get an earlier crop next year. Cut back asparagus ferns to ground level, remove all weeds and top dress with compost. Whilst it is a good idea to cover empty beds with a mulch it is inevitable that birds will scratch through it possibly moving it onto areas from which you will need to clean it up.

Raking over the soil to disturb over wintering grubs will provide food for some pests whilst reducing the number of pests for next year. You can rake over several times between now and spring providing the soil is in a suitable condition.

Ponds should be cleaned out of excess leaves, vegetation and other debris. If a pond with fish in is likely to freeze over, provide something to help form a hole in the ice to allow gases to escape. It might be possible to use netting to prevent leaves entering the water but it is hard to do this attractively and to ensure it does not hinder access for frogs or small birds.

The RHS has published information that in 2020 the UK imported 84% of its fruit and 44% of its vegetables which may account in part for the high inflation on food prices. It is worth considering growing your own to save money. One RHS article suggests five easily grown vegetables that are a way of reducing your carbon footprint. These are beetroot, kales, lettuce, potatoes and runner beans. We have our own thoughts on the list and in view of the widespread failure of Runner Beans in this years heat you should consider growing French Beans instead or as well. The French beans do not need support and are harvestable in around 10 weeks. We would also add Onions, both spring and bulb. Cabbage and Broccoli may be a better choice than Kale. Sweetcorn is easy to grow but takes up a lot of space. Courgettes do very well and often create a glut. Some gardeners only grow early potatoes as they think the taste difference is more noticeable than with maincrop varieties.

For those with a large garden or allotment especially with a greenhouse there can be several opportunities over the Christmas New Year period to escape from the house to get a period of solitude and relative quiet. It can be harvesting the vegetables, checking there is no weather or vandal damage, sowing seeds that must be done in the last week of December, or taking suitable wrapping paper to the compost heap.

A happy Christmas and a prosperous and healthy new year to all.

DISAPPEARANCE OF MY GARDEN BIRDS

The bird situation has been most strange. Until the last few days we have been absolutely birdless for weeks.

The pairs of pigeons that have continually and noisily inhabited our garden for over 20 years have gone completely. We found the remains of one but we don't know if this was through attack or the remains of a dead bird

We have not seen a sparrow, starling or blackbird for months, all regular visitors previously. In the last few days, however, great and blue tits, and robins seem to have returned to a feeder that had been unvisited for a long while. They appear to be in hedges where blackbirds have usually nested, as opposed to trees at the back of the garden that the tits and finches have normally used.

These events have mystified me but I'm pleased at what I hope is the start of a full return. Pigeons I believe are more susceptible to avian flu and their sudden disappearance may be due to that.

COOKERY CORNER

These are some ideas for a few Christmas nibbles from a small cookery book of favourite recipes compiled by The University of Manchester Women's Club in the late 1960's. I have left the measures as they were originally.

Measures: 1oz = approx. 30g 1 cup = 6 fluid ounces

The following dips can be served with a selection of raw vegetables cut into chunks or sticks.

Guacamole (avocado dip)

2 large ripe avocados 2 to 3 tbsp lemon or lime juice cayenne pepper or minced chillies

This makes about one and a half cups. Cut the avocados in half, remove the stones and scoop out the pulp. Mash the pulp coarsely with a fork while blending in the lemon juice to taste. Add a little salt, some cayenne pepper and chillies if you prefer more spice.

Cheesy dip

5 oz sour cream a large carton of Philadelphia cheese a large carton of cottage cheese black pepper and garlic

As these cheeses are now available already flavoured with garlic etc. you can vary the ingredients according to your preference. Blend all together until smooth.

More easy dips

Mix together $\frac{1}{2}$ cup each of sour cream and mayonnaise, 1 heaped tsp each of chopped spring onions and parsley and $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp chopped dill.

Mix equal parts of good mayonnaise and natural yogurt and add chopped chives.

Liquidise some tinned pineapple with cottage cheese and flavour with paprika for an apricot colour.

Mix a soft cheese with a little curry sauce or powder and add a little lime juice.

American potato salad

16oz cold cooked potatoes sliced 8oz chopped celery 2 chopped hard boiled eggs 4oz chopped onion Mix these with 1 tsp each of vinegar and sugar and coat with mayonnaise.

Winter salad which is popular at Christmas as a foil to rich food

Combine together a few finely chopped raw sprouts, chopped celery, 1 or 2 unpeeled red apples cut into cubes, 2 or 3 coarsely chopped satsumas and a few salted peanuts also chopped. Toss them all in a well seasoned French dressing and serve immediately. The exact proportions are not important but only a few sprouts are needed.

Special mince pies

10oz self raising flour finely grated rind and juice of ½ lemon 1oz ground almonds 6oz margarine 3 oz caster sugar 1lb mincemeat with 1tbsp sherry 1 egg and a little milk

Preheat the oven to 200 degrees and grease some tartlet tins enough for 24 pies. Mix the flour and ground almonds together. Cut the margarine into chunks and rub into the flour with your fingertips until it resembles breadcrumbs. Add the sugar, lemon rind and juice, beaten egg and milk. Mix to a firm dough and knead until smooth. Chill for 30 minutes before rolling out thinly onto a floured board. Cut out 48 circles and place 24 in the greased tins. Add a spoonful of mincemeat to each circle. Damp the edges of all the pastry circles, top the pies with the rest of the circles and press the edges firmly. Place in the centre of the oven and bake until golden. Dust with icing sugar.

Recipe for happiness taken from a book produced by the W.I. of Caernarvonshire in the 1960s Equal parts of healthy, honest work, rest and recreation, sifted to remove any lumps of covetousness and despondency, and stirred carefully with diligence, cheerfulness and even temper. Mix to a cream adding sympathy, and colouring with smiles and laughter. Keep where it can be seen. In season at all times and costs a mere thought!

Comments: Objection

Proposal to object on Policy SPL 3 Part A-b. the development relates well to its site and surroundings particularly in relation to its siting, height, scale, massing, form, design and materials.

22/01683/FULHH – Allegro, Aingers Green Road, Aingers Green – Proposed single storey rear extension with glazed roof lantern and first floor rear extension.

Comments: Observation

The PC noted that the ground floor extension had been allowed under permitted development however with the addition of a first-floor rear extension the Council are concerned about the privacy of adjacent properties.

22/138 Great Bentley Cricket Club

Cllr Pippa Dennitts read out a letter from the Cricket Club thanking the Parish Council for its support and a grant given to the Cricket Club.

The Cricket Club requested an extension of the use of the village green by Frinton Cricket Club for 2023 season. It was greed that we accept the cricket club's request for 2023 subject to annual review in 2024.

The Cricket Club requested a conversion of the wicket pitch from grass to an all-weather pitch strip.

It was agreed to support the cricket club's due diligence to explore this first, and to ascertain whether this is possible or not and then bring it back to the Parish Council for further discussion.

22/140 Flag Hill Noticeboard

It was agreed for the Parish Clerk to obtain 3 quotes for a New Noticeboard.

22/143 Coronation Tree (Tree Warden)

It was agreed that a Red Horse Chestnut be planted and that the position of the location of the tree be agreed through the Green Working Group.

22/144 Heckfords Road Litter

It was agreed that the Parish Council support the local litter group and write to TDC to highlight the need for more litter picking.

22/147 The Green Working Party

To discuss Green Working Party Report

- (a) Pond Annual
 - It was agreed that Cllr Bill Herbert source someone to complete pond maintenance.
- (b) New Allotment Access. It was agreed to write to Network Rail to ask when they are planning to come forward to us on their proposals for this land.

Cllr Pippa Dennitts informed the meeting that Locum Clerk Grahame Walkingshaw would be leaving at the end of November.


Cllr Peter Harry asked for Power On to be an agenda item for the next meeting.

FRIENDS OF THE GREEN

At our recent AGM the chairman reported a year of fundraising resulting in an income of £3,225.

During the year the replacement of white railings along Weeley Road was organised and paid for by FOG, with agreement from the Parish Council. Thanks goes to the following for their help towards the project; Norman Dorling for making up the wooden forms to form the new posts; Neil at Weeley Concrete for casting and delivering the new posts and RH



Carpenters for arranging for Nick Cook to assist in the erection of the posts and rails. The railings are part of the Green's history and village people who I have spoken to recently can remember water running from the South Side, past Moorlands towards the Waterworks. There are more railings on Heckford Road, marking water, running from Wades Pond area to the North side going under Heckford Road and eventually towards the Waterworks again. The Parish Council are obtaining costs to replace these.

The Chairman thanked the sponsors of the Suffolk Horses that appeared on Show Day. They were George Wright from Wright Turf, Admirals Farm and Tom Tredgett of ACC Ltd., South Heath Farm. We hope to repeat this next year subject to approval from the show committee.

Our next meeting is in January and we welcome everyone to attend, for details please contact the secretary Ken Drew on 250177. New blood is always welcome, and the main aim is the maintenance and protection of the Green. Judging by recent events and happenings on the Green by utility services the work of this group is even more important for the future of our 42.5 acres!!

Chairman Michael Dorling

On a personal note the amount of damage on various areas of the Green caused by utility works is amazing. In the past it was common practice for companies to contact the Parish Council for permission (always given) and to liaise with them regarding rules and expectations. This seems to have ceased over the past few years. The complete disregard of some companies is certainly not acceptable, and they should when necessary, consult with the owners of the Green i.e. the Parish Council to make arrangements and follow their rules and in some cases, discuss compensation. Just an example of the last three weeks:

- A gas installation at Moorlands resulted in the company having to dig four trenches on the Green to find the mains connection (no accurate map)!
- A gas storage pipe was put under the ground at Green Corner which resulted in two trenches being dug and once again they could not find the main supply (no accurate map)!
- Two weeks ago, an amount of vans and machinery arrived unannounced on the Green, South Side of Weeley Road, and again no one was aware of what was going on . Apparently, they were to dig a trench from the South Side, down the Green to the new development of Hartford Green, Taylor Wimpey site. At the time of writing, they have left but are coming back at some point. In the meantime, the roadside verge where the traffic lights were has been pushed back towards the newly erected white railings by 12/15 inches, making them vulnerable to passing vehicles and machinery. As an aside they must have achieved what they wanted with the trench but managed to cut through BT connections and isolating 50 people until it was repaired. In all these incidents the first representative to the Parish Council has been Bill Herbert who probably in his polite way asked what they were doing. He was latterly joined by Peter Harry and between them are now looking after village peoples interests. One final note on the subject, a trench is to be dug for services to Hartford Green Estate, down the middle of the South Side track. We need a combined effort by everyone to try and protect the village Green.
