GREAT BENTLEY MILITARY VETERANS CLUB A TRIBUTE TO TONY RAMPLING

This month we bring you sad news of the death of our veteran colleague Tony Rampling. Tony passed away at the end of April at the mature age of 99. Tony did his WW2 pre-deployment training at Barnard Castle in County Durham. He landed in Normandy with 61st Reconnaissance Regiment in June 1944. The unit's armoured cars were in the vanguard as German forces were pursued across northern France and into Belgium after the breakout from the invasion beaches. Tony later participated in the ill-fated Arnhem campaign in September 1944, where stiff opposition prevented an armoured column linking up with airborne troops dropped in to capture bridges across the Rhine and into Germany. This Second World War veteran was presented with the Légion d'Honneur, France's highest distinction by the French Army Attache, in appreciation of his role in the liberation of France. It was a pleasure and great honour to chat to Tony and see the remarkable pictures of his military service. Tony can now 'stand-down' and meet up with his Regimental pals again.

Tony would wish us to continue our Veterans Club and so 16 of us met again in May for our monthly breakfast. Much of the conversation was of course football and the 'potential' promotion of Ipswich to the Premier League. Mick Dorling later that day denied being the driver of the gleaming blue Ford TW-2 tractor which was driven down Sir Alf Ramsey Way at the promotion winning game that afternoon. And just for our Royal Navy and Submariner colleagues we must quickly get over the Army rugby win (by a whisker) over the Navy at Twickenham!

There is no doubting the immense pressure our Doctors Surgery finds itself under due to all the new housing developments the impact of which brings forth changes that affect us. The recent announcement that the surgery will not be offering routine blood test appointments for the majority of patients did cause consternation particularly amongst our older folk (that includes me!) and I felt some reassurance was needed. As Chair of the PPG my aim is to support our Doctors Surgery and although, like many of you, I may not be happy about this latest news and the inevitability of more changes as time goes by, I am however confident that decisions will not have been taken lightly and do my utmost to understand and accept them. Never forget and be assured that we are extremely fortunate to have our Hollies Surgery their dedication and care will remain constant. If you have a concern or an issue that you are not happy about they would want you to bring it to their attention in order for it to be addressed. If you are uncertain regarding difficulties you may encounter when accessing blood tests seek their guidance. Yes being held in a long queue on the telephone is frustrating but there is nothing we can do about it. We all want our time when our turn comes, please employ patience and respect towards the staff they will be doing their best.

I do encourage you to come along to our PPG Meeting on Thursday 25th July at 6.30pm in The Village Hall where as is usual one of our Doctor's will be our guest. They are always generous with their time bringing us Surgery news and offering the opportunity to ask questions. Below are the details of Blood Test Services:

PET NOTES

Vaccinations are important for keeping your pet healthy and are given alongside a health check by a veterinary surgeon. In my experience, most pet owners don't know what their pet is being vaccinated against, they just understand it's important and trust their vet to give the correct vaccine at the correct time. It's wonderful pet owners have this level of faith in vets, but for the curious I have written a brief overview of vaccinations in this article.

DOGS

The core vaccinations protect against distemper, hepatitis, parvovirus and leptospirosis. The primary vaccination protocol sometimes varies between practices based on the disease threat in the area but as a guide a puppy will receive two vaccinations followed by a full booster one year later. The dog is then on a three year cycle with the full vaccine given once every three years and a booster against leptospirosis annually in between.

Many dog owners choose to vaccinate against kennel cough too. This does not require a primary protocol and is simply given annually. I think of the kennel cough as being much like the flu vaccine; it is not as effective as the core vaccines (which are incredibly effective) but it reduces the risk of the dog catching kennel cough and those who are unlucky enough to experience milder symptoms.

During pregnancy it is advised to vaccinate against herpes too.

For dogs travelling abroad, a rabies vaccination is required. This is not necessary for those who will not leave the UK.

CATS

The vaccination protocol is similar to dogs in that kittens receive two vaccinations in the primary course, followed by annual boosters on a three year cycle. Cats are vaccinated against flu, enteritis and leukaemia. (Some owners of indoor cats may opt not to vaccinate against leukaemia.)

For cats travelling abroad, a rabies vaccination is required. This is not necessary for those who will not leave the UK.

RABBITS

Rabbit vaccinations have progressed enormously since I graduated. I used to be required to give a booster against myxomatosis every six months and it was injected directly into – not under – the skin. It caused significant vasoconstriction (narrowing of the blood vessels) so if I accidentally injected my finger I would need to rush to A&E. Thankfully that didn't happen and these days the boosters are much safer for the vet as well as protecting the rabbit against more viruses and for longer. In the present day, rabbits receive an annual vaccination against myxomatosis and rabbit haemorrhagic disease.

After reading this article, if you are concerned your pet may not be up to date with their vaccinations, please contact your vet for advice. Last year there was a terrible parvovirus outbreak in Tendring so it's very important to keep your pet(s) protected.

In exciting news, Weeley Veterinary Centre has been invited as a finalist at the BestUKVets Awards 2024. Last year we won the ultimate prize and were crowned "Best Vet UK 2023". COOKERY CORNER

ANZAC BISCUITS and others



The 25th of April is an annual National Day of Remembrance in Australia and New Zealand, originally to honour members of the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps (ANZAC) who took part in the Allied Expedition to distract the Turkish army from other Allied troops landing further down the peninsula. On April 25th 1915, 16,000 Australian and New Zealanders landed, and immediately met fierce Turkish resistance which continued for eight months with heavy casualties and eventually resulted in a forced evacuation of all remaining Allied troops. Recently we visited the ANZAC Museum in Albany, Western Australia and stood overlooking King George Sound, the sheltered bay where one of the many convoys of ships assembled prior to their ill-fated campaign. Among the rations sent out by sea from Australia and New Zealand to the fighting troops were biscuits baked by the ladies at home. These were of necessity very hard, able to survive a long sea voyage and last a long time, replacing bread, and became known as hardtack rations, and eventually, because of their

origin, as ANZAC biscuits. Fortunately the recipe has been added to and altered over the years and we no longer have to endure a "jawbreaker" with our elevenses.

ANZAC BISCUITS

75g butter 2tsp golden syrup ½ rounded tsp ground cinnamon ½ tsp bicarbonate of soda 50g caster sugar 50g rolled oats 50g plain flour 50g desiccated coconut

Preheat the oven to 150 degrees and line two baking sheets with non-stick baking paper. Melt the butter in a large pan with the syrup and cinnamon. When hot, add the bicarbonate of soda and two teaspoons of water, stirring well. Quickly add the sugar, oats, flour and coconut and mix thoroughly. Put ten to twelve heaped teaspoons of the mixture onto each baking sheet, spaced well apart. Bake for 12 to 15 minutes or until lightly golden and cooked. Leave the biscuits to cool on the sheets for about 5 minutes, then remove to a wire rack using a palette knife, to cool and firm.

LEMON SWIRL BISCUITS

110 softened butter 50g sifted icing sugar grated zest and 1tsp juice of a lemon 125g plain flour a piping bag with a fancy nozzle eg. a star

Preheat the oven to 160 degrees and line two baking sheets with non-stick baking paper. Cream the butter and sugar together in a large bowl. Sift in the flour and mix in the lemon zest. Gradually add the lemon juice and mix everything together well to make a stiff biscuit mixture. Spoon this into a piping bag fitted with your chosen nozzle and pipe small swirls onto the baking sheets. Space them out well apart as they will spread. As you lift the nozzle from each swirl, trim the mixture with a knife so it is neat. Bake in the preheated oven for 12 to 15 minutes until lightly golden and cooked. Leave the biscuits to cool for about a minute then transfer to a wire rack using a slice or spatula. They will keep in an airtight container for a few days.

QUICK COOKIES

125g softened butter 5g vanilla extract 225g caster sugar 1 well beaten egg

225g self-raising flour 5g bicarbonate of soda

You could use the finely grated zest of an orange or 100g raisins instead of vanilla essence. Preheat the oven to 190 degrees and line two baking trays with non-stick baking paper, or use non-stick trays. In a large bowl beat the butter, vanilla extract, sugar and a pinch of salt. Add the egg and beat again until combined, then gradually add the flour and bicarbonate of soda and mix to a soft dough, and lastly mixing in the vanilla extract or your chosen flavour. With wet hands roll the dough into twelve balls. Flatten each one to 5mm thick and place well apart on the trays. Bake in the preheated oven for 8 minutes for soft cookies, or 10 minutes for crisp cookies. Remove and leave to cool for a minute then transfer to a wire rack using a metal spatula or palette knife. **M.E**.

Bad parking under the highway code. Police can intervene if the vehicle is a danger to the highway i.e a complete block likely to cause an accident, where other vehicles etc cannot pass.

BURGLARY

There have been burglaries in surrounding villages. Please be vigilant when leaving the house. Check all doors and windows are closed and locked and if you were ever thinking of getting **ring doorbell or CCTV**, now is a good time to invest. Both will give peace of mind, to whether anyone has been on or around your property and great evidence if the inevitable were to happen. Most these days have **phone apps**, on motion detection, you are alerted which gives you the chance to ring 999 if anything untoward is taking place. Most have **2 way conversation** too, so a few choice words could also assist. Also great for when the local cat is about to leave a little **present** on your lawn.

Motion sensor **floodlights** are a good deterrent too. Anyone up to no good is less likely to continue when they are lit up and this helps with visibility for the cameras in **poor light**. Keep front garden gates **closed** if you have them and if you have plans for an annual **vacation**, ask the neighbours to put a car on your driveway, giving the impression **someone is there**. Lights on **timers** are also a great deterrent and radios, all giving the same illusion.

FRAUD

We have seen an increase in reports of people being scammed when buying **vehicles online**. Typically, these scams involve criminals posting non-existent vehicles or vehicle parts on social media. Scammers will use stolen images of genuine vehicles and sometimes even feature a fake address. The victim then sends the criminals money in anticipation that the vehicle will be delivered. However, it never is and when the victim attempts to contact the seller, they discover the ad and the seller have disappeared. To avoid falling for these scams, use our top tips when browsing online for a new car:

- Be wary of a bargain, as this is common tactic scammers use to lure you in. Be especially careful when
 using an online marketplace.
- Check documents ask to see the seller's vehicle logbook (V5C). This is needed when a vehicle is sold so legitimate sellers should have it.
- Ask for the registration number and check that the details match up on the DVLA's vehicle enquiry service.
- Look out for pressure-selling tactics, such as telling you that a lot of other people are interested in the vehicle, or you only have a limited time to buy it. Don't pay for anything until you've inspected the vehicle. During your inspection, check that the documents and vehicle details all match up. Don't pay via bank transfer, as it offers little protection. Instead use a platform such as PayPal or a credit card for additional protection if things go wrong.

Cllr McWilliams got to see some of the work conducted in the daily life of a PCSO. As usual there were a few parking problems to address with the help of a CPI (considerate parking initiative) and patrols around a few of the hot spot areas. Welfare visits were conducted to victims of crime, with security advice given. Extra patrols were carried out in these areas.

Suspicious circumstances.

If you see anything that does not look right, report it. Try and get as much information as you can, including registration numbers, which are key to a lot of activity. The more you have, the more chance we have of a positive investigation, with results.

Aurora Borealis

There was no need to travel to the Arctic Circle last weekend (see the front cover).

All over the country we were treated to the Northern Lights. Social media was covered with pictures.

So, what is this phenomenon and why does it look better through the lens of a camera or Smart Phone.

The night lights we see come from charged particles discharged from the Sun's surface. Some particles eventually intersect with the earth and are saved by the Earth's magnetic field, moving towards the poles. These collide with atmospheric atoms and molecules so what we are seeing are atoms and molecules in our atmosphere colliding with particles from the sun.

The reason that it looks better through a lens is due to eye sensitivity which of course changes as we age. The exposure on a camera allows in more light which allows you to see the intense colours.

On a very chilly 21st April having lost the toss Great Bentley took to the field against West Bergholt in their first league match of the season. Michael Wright took the first over from the pavilion end while Sam Busby opened from the Surgery end knocking over the middle stump with his first ball of the season. Both bowlers kept it tight with the opening eight overs going for just 18 runs for that one wicket. In search of those elusive wickets Captain Alex Youngs chose to change the bowler from the pavilion end with Lily Wainer coming on. But it was Busby, kept on at the surgery end, who got the ball to swing and took a further four wickets in quick succession to leave the visitors in disarray on 45-6 after 13 overs. The other wicket fell to some sharp fielding from both debutant George Spector and bowler Lily Wainer. Busby ended a fantastic spell on 7-1-15-5. Youngs then rotated the bowling of young Jakes Pearce, Dan Barker, and Spector. All bowled well picking up a wicket each. Wright returned for a two over cameo taking the final wicket. Spector deserves a special mention with his metronomic accuracy costing just 8 runs in 8 overs. West Bergholt were all out for 118 off 39 overs. A low total, but given the conditions favoured the bowlers, one the small crowd thought may prove tricky to chase. Bentleys innings didn't start well with three wickets falling for just 20 runs. Barker, who opened the innings, was hitting the ball nicely but the conditions meant boundaries were hard to come by. Barker and Alfie Youngs steadied the ship taking the score to 54 before a mix up led to Youngs being run out. This was the start of a minicollapse with three wickets falling for 10 runs, including Barker for a hard earned 30. Bentley were in trouble on 65-6 off 19 overs. Bergholt saw light at the end of the tunnel expecting victory was approaching, but that light was, in fact, the express train that was player of the match Sam Busby. Building an innings with well worked singles initially with Jakes Pearce then George Spector he exploded into action in the twenty-seventh over hitting 21 in 5 balls to bring victory within reach. Spector took singles in the next two overs leaving Busby to hit back-to-back fours to bring up his 28 ball 50 and win the match for Bentley by 3 wickets.

Unfortunately, our next game vs. Kelvedon away was cancelled due to the weather. However, we used the rest well and were ready for Boxted at home on 5th May when the Green finally basked in the long overdue sunshine. Boxted won the toss and elected to field. Barney Morton and Alfie Youngs opened the batting and put on 67 for the first wicket running hard as boundaries were hard to come by due to the slow outfield. Morton made a dashing 50 off 40 balls before retiring and Youngs was out caught for 17. Once the wicket fell the run rate slowed with Mark Pearce anchoring the innings with many well-timed shots that, on a faster outfield, would have produced runs. The middle order of Johnny Hesketh (21), Dan Barker (28) and Alex Youngs (17) all contributed to valuable partnerships with Pearce who remained not out on 35 in a total of 189/4 off our 40 overs. After tea was taken Mike Wright opened the bowling from the pavilion end while George Spector started from the surgery end. But it was a brilliant piece of fielding from Barney who ran out the Boxted opener after running for a second -- a flat fast accurate throw hit the stumps with the batsman well out of his ground. Wright bowled an uninterrupted eight over spell returning incredible figures of 8-1-11-2. Spector again bowled very accurately only going for 20 runs but no wickets. At the half-way drinks break, thanks to not only the excellent bowling but also the faultless fielding. Boxted were limited to just 47/3 from 20 overs. After drinks Lily Wainer bowled brilliantly and was very unlucky not to take a wicket returning figures of 7-2-16-0. With Boxted struggling to get any runs Captain Alex Young's turned to last year's player of the year, Dan Barker, who used his flight and spin to take three quick wickets in an inspired spell 6-0-14-3. Jakes Pearce and Alfie Youngs came on to finish the overs and bowled fast hostile spells not conceding many runs. Both were unfortunate not to clean up the Boxted tail but Youngs did pick up a late wicket with a wicked ball that smashed into the stumps. Boxted finished on 89/7 well short of the required target. Another great win for GBCC that puts us second in the league. Player of the Match was hard to pick given the all-round great team performance but for his opening eight over spell that really put Boxted on the back foot it was awarded to Mike Wright.

It's not just the adults who have been in action, the Colts are also playing in their leagues. The U11s opened their account with a great win against a strong Brightlingsea side by 228 to 225. Esme Giles playing a leading role with both bat (6 runs) and ball, taking two wickets for two runs. The U13s played their first fixture against an impressive Frinton XI. The combined Gt. Bentley/Gt. Bromley XI batted first and scored a respectable 109/8 with Rueben Esposito opening and top scoring on 20. Daniel Blacker held together the middle order ending just behind on 17 not out including back-to-back fours. Frinton, despite some excellent bowling by Freddie Pope (2/29) and a luckless Jodie Black, who bowled her usual accurate line and length going for just one run in her two overs, made the total with five overs to spare. Frinton winning by 7 wickets.

TENDRING DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

New chairman's 'privilege' to be elected as Tendring District Council celebrates 50th anniversary

The new chairman of Tendring District Council (TDC) says it is a "privilege" to be elected to the role as the authority marks its 50th anniversary. Councillor Dan Casey was voted in as chairman of TDC at a meeting of the full council on Tuesday, April 30th.

Councillor Casey, who had been vice chairman for the past year, replaces outgoing chairman Gary Scott. Councillor Casey said his chosen causes for the year could include a local animal charity, local veterans' groups, and support for people in need in Jaywick.

Speaking to fellow councillors, Councillor Casey said: "I would like to see us all work together for the good of all. I feel privileged to have been chosen as Chairman of the council – especially to do so as we mark 50 years since Tendring District Council was formed – and I hope I can serve you all well."

Tendring District Council was formed in April 1974 following a merger of the Borough of Harwich with Brightlingsea, Clacton and Frinton and Walton Urban Districts along with Tendring Rural District Council. Councillor Bill Davidson was elected to serve as vice chairman for the coming year. As well as presiding over TDC full council meetings, the chairman of the council has a ceremonial role and represents the council and district at civic events.

Residents are being asked to say what they would like in the future for sport and leisure in Tendring

A consultation has been launched regarding Tendring District Council's (TDC) draft Sports and Activity Strategy. The draft strategy has already been set out with a five-year approach to developing and providing sport and leisure activity in the district.

It is hoped the new strategy will give increased opportunities for people to become active where they live, with a wider focus on community activity by supporting and facilitating local clubs, organisations and partners across the district.

Subject to the consultation and funding being identified, key actions include facilitating more sports events and community facilities such as play zones and multi-use games areas, opening up cycling and walking routes and to explore providing virtual exercise classes. But it should be appreciated that not all actions would necessarily be funded as funds may be limited, but an initial funding of £122,530 has been allocated towards a strategy.

A feasibility study for the potential of an "Active Wellbeing Centre" in the district is also being commissioned. The study would also support a review of leisure facilities to ensure they remain on a sustainable financial footing. It is hoped the new strategy may be adopted this summer.

Commemorative events to mark 80th anniversary of D-Day

COMMEMORATIVE events are set to take place across Tendring to mark the 80th anniversary of the D-Day Landings. The commemorations will include a service at Clacton War Memorial as well as two nostalgic shows at Clacton's Princes Theatre later this summer.

The events will mark the 80th anniversary of D-Day, which saw the start of Allied operations to liberate Western Europe from Nazi German control during the Second World War.

The service, organised by the Clacton Royal British Legion and supported by Tendring District Council (TDC), will take place at the war memorial in Clacton's seafront gardens on Thursday, 6 June, at 11 am. Everyone is welcome to attend.

On 11th June at 2 pm, it will be staging 'Thanks for the Memories' featuring heartwarming nostalgic songs and a flag waving finale paying tribute to the veterans of the armed forces.

On September 22nd at 2 pm, the theatre will host The D-Day Darlings' 80th Anniversary Tour, which will see the wartime-inspired group perform the best loved songs of the era.

This year's Clacton Airshow on 22-23 August will also have an overarching D-Day theme, with the iconic RAF Battle of Britain Memorial Flight headlining the event. Aircraft had a crucial role to play in Operation Overlord with Lancaster bombers flying sorties ahead of and during D-Day to soften up the German defences, while Hurricanes supported communications between the invasion forces and headquarters in Britain.

Councillor Dan Casey, Chairman of Tendring District Council and the President of the Clacton Royal British Legion and TDC Vice-Chairman, said: "At the time, D-Day was a beacon of hope for the millions of people living under Nazi oppression. It saw the Allied invasion of France and ultimately led to the end of the war in Europe within a year. It was a turning point in the war, but also a sad occasion for the many families who lost loved ones during the operation. This year marks a major anniversary of that operation, and we will be paying tribute to those who gave their lives so that we may have the freedom we enjoy today."

Clacton's Princes Theatre, which is run by TDC, will be hosting two epic shows with a D-Day twist.

VILLAGE MARATHON FIVE RAISE 23k FOR CHARITIES

Five Great Bentley residents put their running skills to the test by completing the recent London Marathon and raising over £23,000 pounds for charity in the process. Sarah-Jane Bennett, Emma Blowers, Ben Fryer, Ian Picken and Lawrence Robinson had differing levels of running experience when they started training at the beginning of the year, but all completed the 26.2 mile course for the first time ever.

Sarah-Jane raised £4,000 for Just4Children, who were raising money for local boy Angus Grocott, who needs ongoing treatment for his Cerebral Palsy that is not currently provided by the NHS. Emma raised exactly the same amount for Chron's and Colitis UK, who have supported her and her family since she was diagnosed with Chrone's when she was 12. Ben raised £4,200 for the NSPCC, who give children who have suffered torment and abuse in the past, a second chance at life. Ian, and his brother Paul, ran for the Sick Children's Trust, with Ian raising £5,630 pounds in memory of his daughter Seren. Lawrence raised £5,607 for Children With Cancer UK, who fund life-saving research into childhood cancer and support children and their families.

The five spent around 16 weeks running the local roads in training and have organised countless fundraising events in and around the village over the past year. Ben said "It was nice to have others close by who knew exactly what I was going through whilst training. The WhatsApp group was fun and helped us get through the days when we really didn't fancy a 16-mile training run. There were numerous doubts in the training, when we realised just how far we had to run, but we were able to support each other and we all got there in the end." As for the actual day itself, plenty of their families and friends turned up to support, which Ben said was a huge lift, "To see some familiar Great Bentley faces on the way round was the boost we all needed, particularly once you were past the 20 mile mark. The village really turned out in force, with banners and all sorts. Then when we got back home, we realised just how many people had been tracking us and willing us on from afar. Throw in the support that so many in the village put in for all the charity days and the messages in the build-up and you have to say that it all helped us get to the finish line. It was a day that will live long in the memory and thanks to everyone in the village for all the support and donations."

Farming Diaries

With the farming year in full swing now and nearly all cropping in the ground the work load varies greatly depending on what the farmers are growing.

Cereal growers will have, or will be, in the next few days applying their final fungicides to ensure they prevent any disease creeping into the crop which could dramatically affect the quality of the final yield. The quality of the harvested yield is very important as the millers and the bread makers have very stringent specifications which farmers work to all season to ensure their produce meets the standards required. Protein levels in the wheat grain can



affect the quality of bread or too much nitrogen in barley can make it impractical in the brewing industry so it is important that farmers get these levels correct. After their final fungicide cereal growers will begin to look ahead to harvest ensuring that their grain stores are cleaned out ready to store the harvested crop and looking at trial results and varieties for the coming season ahead.

Farmers who have root crops such as potatoes, carrots, onions or sugar beet are much busier at this time of the year. They will be concentrating on weed control to avoid competition between weeds and the crop can mean that the crop is unable to access nutrients, fertiliser and water all which are vital in their growth and development.

You will often see irrigators applying water to potato, onion and turf crops. Applications of water are precisely planned with the use of neutron probes measuring the soil moisture deficit so that not too much water is applied which would result in lazy root development. Equally, potato crops must not dry out when the tubers are forming as this would lead to the development of scab making the potato unsellable.

Farmers are also trying to prevent disease coming into the crop which can dramatically impact yield in the same way as the wheat example given in last month's article. Blight is the biggest concern to all potato growers with total crop destruction occurring if it is not controlled. This comes at a cost of around £3bn per year to the potato industry. Farmers use various tools including national forecasting services which are e-mailed to them directly as the weather conditions that cause blight occur, using local knowledge and assessing crops regularly as and when spores start to move around in the air.

Potato farmers have a narrow window from planting the potatoes to harvesting them to ensure that weeds and disease are controlled and making sure they have enough water and the right nutrition. Salad varieties such as Charlotte or Maris Peer will only be growing for around 90 days at which point they will be desiccated (the crop is 'topped') to prevent further growth to ensure they meet the stringent supermarket requirements (similar to the cereal standards mentioned earlier) which stipulate a specific size, skin finish and skin blemishes. Other varieties such as Maris Piper or Estima are left to reach maximum size as their markets require large potatoes for chipping or baking. You will notice in the local area that there has been an increase in the number of fields in which maize is being grown. Some of this maize will be grown to feed cattle on farms, but a large proportion of it will be going into a local A.D. Plant (Anaerobic digestion plant), A.D. plants are becoming more widespread across the country. They carry out a natural process where plant and animal materials (biomass) are broken down by micro-organisms in the absence of air - hence the term anaerobic digestion. The A.D. process is when the biomass, of which there are many suitable forms including food waste, slurry and manure are put inside a sealed tank or digester. Naturally occurring micro-organisms digest the biomass, which in turn releases a methane rich gas (biogas) that can be used to generate renewable heat and power; this helps to cut fossil fuel use and reduce greenhouse gas emissions. The remaining material also known as digestate is rich in nutrients so it can be used as fertiliser. The AD process is not a new technology, it has been used in the UK since the late 1800s, but now an increasing number of AD plants are being built in the UK to generate clean renewable energy.

We often have friends or family members contacting us about a patient. Due to patient confidentiality, we are not able to discuss their details with anyone else unless we have express written consent from the patient to do this. This includes even just confirming an appointment time or date. Our staff often experience dissatisfied patients as a result, but they would be breaking the law if they complied and have no option but to refuse their request.

If there is frequently a need to discuss someone else's details and they are happy for us to do this, they just need to write to us expressing consent to talk to the named person. In order to try and make this as easy as possible, we have a form that can be collected from reception for the patient to complete, giving consent for someone to speak to us on their behalf. Once this has been completed and returned to the Surgery it will be noted on the patient's record.

We have noticed a significant increase in the number of patients who are not attending their appointments and who have not contacted the Surgery to let us know they will be unable to attend. In March we had 170 missed appointments and in April 161 missed appointments.

NATURE NOTES

The crossover between horticulture and the main focus of this column is reflected in the rapid demise of Box. A valuable evergreen that as well as being familiar in gardens is a rare native shrub reaching tree proportions in chalky places like Boxhill in Surrey.

Now moribund small almost leafless box hedges are a familiar sight and in my garden I've cut down several, some well over a hundred years old. The main cause of this is the very recent arrival of the Box moth from New Zealand. I first noticed its depredations in South London but in the past two-three years it has fully reached our part of Essex.

Sprays and pheromone traps can be tried but their success is unclear and demands a great deal of effort. Finding a similar alternative small-leaved evergreen shrub now seems the main option. The familiar "Poor Man's Box" Lonicera nitida has always been an alternative for low hedging. But more recently small members of the Euonymus [Spindle] and Ilex [Holly allies] are becoming better known. I recently noticed a row of very box-like car park planting in Colchester that proved the former and when visiting Notcutts in Woodbridge was shown some small Ilex and was advised that it takes a better trim quite akin to box.

Box blight is a soil borne condition fatal to this blameless shrub that has endured the centuries as garden topiary, but this disease seems quite secondary to the recent damage inflicted by the moth. Unlike many insect pests it is quite large and attractive, with silvery forewings and pale brown beneath. After the caterpillars strip the leaves any regrowth is soon trimmed off by further generations, leaving just skeletal branches.

This is a telling example of the unintended consequences, in this age of pandemics across national borders, of the need for greater international bio-security with accidental introductions of problem species accompanying intended legitimate imports.

- There were 2,400 fountains for which a giant aqueduct was built to bring water from the River Seine in Paris
- For a banquet, 20,000 candles lit the chandeliers in the famous 'Hall of Mirrors', only 3,000 on a normal day
- BUT...very few toilets, so Versailles actually became known as 'the filthiest palace in Europe'

Quick action saves lives and reduces suffering – DON'T leave it June 2024

A tawny owl and a kestrel were both brought to us with dreadful injuries from traffic collisions. The owl had his ulna and radius exposed, and the kestrel's wing was barely hanging on. These were not new injuries, so after being hit by cars they were left to suffer long lingering deaths, and by the time they arrived at Wildlives it was not possible to save them. Accidents happen to even the most careful of drivers, but if you hit something PLEASE stop and check to see whether it is dead. In the best scenario you might save a life, and in the worst case you can minimise the suffering of an animal or bird, rather than leaving them to a long lingering death.

A fox cub, now named Flint, got his head stuck in a watering can and was left, thrashing around, unable to see and struggling to breathe for several days. A neighbour reported him to us and Emily went to rescue him. He had severe heat stroke, dehydration and was starving. After 5 days in intensive care he remains on the critical list as fluid has built up under the skin of his head which has become infected. We continue to give him intensive care, and hope for his recovery. If he had been rescued sooner the situation would not be nearly as dire.

A heron became caught in netting over a koi pond, and was left, tangled there, over several days before a neighbour intervened and rescued him. Sadly the damage was so extensive he was beyond help, including a huge untreatable calcified lump on his leg. If wild-life friendly netting had been used he would not have been caught. Possibly also with good stiff wildlife-friendly netting he would not have managed to catch the huge pond fish caught in his gullet. If he had been rescued sooner he might have been saved.

Sooty and Sweep, jackdaw chicks, were brought to Wildlives after their nest was disturbed when the chimney was swept. Jackdaws are not the quietest of birds, so the occupants must have known they were there. Under the Wildlife & Countryside Act 1981, it is ILLEGAL to take, damage or destroy a wild bird's nest while it's being used or built and this can incur an unlimited fine, six months in prison, or both. Always check for nests before doing work. Chimneys should be cleaned in Autumn.

Evie, from Home Farm School, did a 5 mile walk, a bake sale on the door step and organised a collection of dog food with her class along with a talk on why wildlife is so important (and there is more dog food being collected at another school so hopefully more to follow). A **big** thanks to Evie who has raised over £700 plus food for Wildlives.

With the recent rain, grass is growing long and already we have had two admissions of strimmed hedgehogs with horrendous injuries. One had his leg sliced off and the other had been cut so that all the internal organs were visible – we could see his liver and lungs in the injury. Before you strim, or do any garden work, PLEASE check the area you are going to be working in. A few minutes can save a life.

Bentley Green Players Murdered to Death (Behind the Scenes) 2024

In January this year, the Drama Group were into discussions regarding possible plays for the annual May production. In choosing a play we have to consider several criteria; can it be staged within the confines of the Methodist Hall, staging, scenery lighting etc has to be brought in and constructed within a 24 hour period due to other bookings for the hall; do we have a suitable cast, with the limited number of group members we have? Is the play one



that the Village audience would appreciate? Do we have enough in the budget – (a 3 night production costs around £1200-£1500 for scripts, hall hire and performance licences) which does rather limit the options available. This year it was eventually decided to revisit a previous production, Murdered to Death by Peter Gordon was considered. It was last produced in 2004 starring Ken Drew, Lynda McWilliams, and Tom Edwards to mention a few. It was also noted that other cast and crew members were sadly no longer with us, Stephanie and Terry Sadler, Alan Coles, Billy Soar, Dave Ross and the Director at the time, John Moss. On reading the script, a spoof murder mystery in the style of Agatha Christie, it was clear that the humour and intrigue had not changed. So it was decided to re-run Murdered to Death 2024. It met the criteria and was a worthy tribute to past members of Bentley Green Players.

Chris Whiteman agreed to be the Director, with Peter Harry as Producer. At the auditions several members elected to reprise their roles from 2004, Chris Whiteman as "Dodgy Pierre", Rachael Allen (nee Keeble) as Elizabeth Hartley-Trumpington, Liz Fossey (nee Moss) as Dorothy and Jennie Moss took on the role of Mildred having played Margaret in 2004. The rest of the cast were Colonel Craddock – Peter Harry, Margaret Craddock – Bev Adams, the interfering busybody, Miss Maple - Donna Morphew, and Bunting (the ever present Butler) - Ross Olding. We welcomed back lan Medway as the put - upon Constable Thompkins and finally Leigh Copsey as Inspector Pratt, the bumbling, incompetent but "finely tuned crime detection machine".

In February rehearsals got underway in earnest with lots of fun and laughter. It soon became clear why this play had been selected in 2004 and understood to be much appreciated by the audience at the time. Set in the 1930s, thoughts turned to costumes, always tricky to find and to achieve some authenticity. This year we were delighted to find the services of Annette Page who provided much knowledgeable advice and trawled through the internet, second hand shops and costume sales as well as a stitch here and there. We were also delighted when Olivia Medway agreed to help out as makeup and hair stylist. As production dates neared, advertising, ticket sales, set design, lighting and sound all had to be considered, along with the necessary period furniture, culminating in the set build. Without the small army of willing helpers, set crew and technicians, none of this would have been possible. Light and Sound - Matt Plummer and Liam Olding. Set Crew included most of the cast plus Len Clayden, David Cordell, Richard Upston, Michael Dennitts and Bob Starsmeare – the Stage Manager.

On performance nights, there was another small army of volunteers in Front of House, Ken Drew, Pippa Dennitts, Liz Harry, Lynda McWilliams, Jo Herbert, Carol Kerridge and Sharon Olding who coped 'exceedingly' well with the refreshments. If you have been counting it takes around 30 Group members and willing volunteers to put on a production for 3 performances — no small undertaking especially as we have to transport from storage and build our own stage to create a theatrical setting and atmosphere from scratch!

This years production, judging from the audience reaction and post-performance comments went very well much to everyone's relief. The audience was 170 over the 3 nights which was heartwarming and greatly appreciated, plus it meant we covered our costs!!

Thoughts now turn to our next production in October – a one night performance of two one act plays – watch this space!
